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

### The Story of Our Nuteracker Production

Performances of *The Nutcracker* have grown in a great American and Lehigh Valley tradition. The Lehigh Valley's *Nutcracker* tradition began fifty-one years ago in 1968. It was sponsored by The Junior League of the Lehigh Valley and was initially performed at the Allentown Symphony Hall, under the direction of Alexi Ramov. Through the generous grant contribution from The Junior League of the Lehigh Valley, and countless volunteer hours, the Ballet Guild's *Nutcracker* began.

While the Ballet Guild has undergone numerous changes throughout its own sixty-one year history, one constant in the organization's seasonal calendar has been our annual *Nutcracker* production. Countless Lehigh Valley children and adults have performed in *The Nutcracker* production under the direction of Alexi Ramov, Oleg Briansky and Mireille Briane, Aram Manukyan and current Artistic Director, Karen Kroninger Knerr. In addition, several Ballet Guild students have returned as professional guest artists to appear in this annual holiday treat. These alumni include: Peter Degnan and Susan Taylor Degnan of the Pittsburgh Ballet Theatre; Richard Fritz of the Los Angeles Ballet Company; Leslie Jonas of the Boston Ballet; Karen Kroninger, then of the Juilliard School; and Joseph Fritz of the New Jersey Ballet/Metropolitan Opera Ballet. The Ballet Guild has also brought the magic of *The Nutcracker* to over 100,000 local school students as part of our popular school performances.

Because of the initial contribution of The Junior League of the Lehigh Valley, countless volunteers, the Ballet Guild's Board of Directors, the hard work and dedication of our previous and current artistic directors and dancers, the generous support of our sponsors and donors and the greater Lehigh Valley community, the Ballet Guild is proud to present its 51st consecutive *Nutcracker* production. Thank you for experiencing the magic and precision that we call *The Nutcracker*. Enjoy the show.



### The Story of The Nuteracker

It is Christmas Eve. There is a party in the home of Dr. and Mrs. Stahlbaum, who are decorating the tree with the help of the maids. Clara and Fritz, the children of the house, exclaim with delight as they peep through the keyhole. Relatives and friends arrive for the evening's festivities. Once everyone has settled in, Dr. Stahlbaum organizes games and dances. After the presents have been distributed, there is an ominous occurrence: when the clock chimes, a frightening old owl flaps its wings and lights flicker eerily. The startled children run to their parents, and Herr Drosselmeyer appears at the door. He is a family friend, but nonetheless mysterious, with a patch covering one of his eyes! He has brought his handsome nephew Karl with him, and two boxes, which produce a Mechanical Doll and a Soldier Doll. In addition, there is a Nutcracker for Clara, which he presents to her after he demonstrates how it works. When her brother Fritz mischievously snatches it away and stomps on it, Herr Drosselmeyer repairs the broken Nutcracker's head by tying it in a handkerchief. Soon, all the girls are rocking their dolls to sleep.

The boys harass them by noisily tooting their trumpets and bugles. Shortly it is time for everyone to go to bed. Once all the guests have gone, Clara retrieves the Nutcracker, and cradling it in her arms, falls asleep on the sofa, where her mother covers her and lets her sleep. Suddenly, at midnight, Clara is awakened by the chiming of the clock, and is terrified to see Herr Drosselmeyer on the Grandfather clock flapping his cape. She jumps up and begins to run but encounters mice scurrying in every direction. In the midst of her dream, the Christmas tree begins to grow! Herr Drosselmeyer appears again, and from the folds of his cape emerges a life-sized Nutcracker. Magically, toy soldiers appear. The Nutcracker marshals them into battle against the mice and their King. At the height of the battle, Clara throws her slipper at the Mouse King, striking and stunning him, and the Nutcracker runs him through with his sword!

Magically Clara and The Nutcracker are transported to The Land of Snow under the spell of the Snow Queen and her Cavalier. In The Kingdom of Sweets, the Sugar Plum Fairy makes a regal entry attended by angels. When Clara and Herr Drosselmeyer's nephew—transformed into a Prince—arrive, they are greeted by the Sugar Plum Fairy, who invites them to taste some sweets. The Prince and Clara are seated on the throne and view the sumptuous offerings of the Sugar Plum Fairy's Kingdom, including Chocolate from Spain, Coffee from Arabia, Tea from China, Candy Canes, and Marzipan treats. Mother Ginger and her little Polichinelles arrive, as well as Waltzing Flowers and a Dew Drop, and there is a beautiful pas de deux by the Sugar Plum Fairy and her Cavalier. At the end of the Finale, everyone bids farewell to Clara and the Prince, as a walnut-shell boat carries them off—to where and what we shall never know. Yet, this is the magic and the beauty of *The Nutcracker*.

#### **Artistic Director**



*Karen Kroninger Knerr*, Artistic Director since 2007, holds a BFA in Dance from the Juilliard School where she trained in Graham, Taylor, and Limon techniques. She was a principal dancer with the Albany Berkshire Ballet, where she performed lead roles in *Cinderella* and *Coppélia*, as well as performing *Girl At Mirror* for the opening of the Norman Rockwell Museum in Stockbridge, MA. In addition, Karen was a member of the Ellen Sinopoli Dance Company. She has worked with and performed works by Dennis Nahat, Laura Dean, Frances Patrelli and Bill T. Jones. Karen holds an Intermediate Certification in Labanotation and is an ABT Certified Teacher, having completed intensive training in the American Ballet Theatre National

Training Curriculum, a high-quality artistic training that is combined with the basics of dancer health and child development. She has developed the outreach program, "Discover Dance", for the Ballet Guild of the Lehigh Valley. Karen teaches students from beginner level to advanced level for BGLV and has choreographed various works including Youth programs for the Allentown Symphony. In August 2019, Karen received her Certification in Progressing Ballet Technique.

#### **Artistic Directors Emeriti**



Oleg Briansky & Mireille Briane brought to the Ballet Guild, during their over ten years as Artistic Directors, the impeccable credentials of those whose careers have included extensive performing, and who are recognized as world-renowned teachers and coaches. During his years as a premier danseur, Oleg Briansky partnered such leading ballerinas as Margot Fonteyn, Maria Tallchief, and Violette Verdy. He is Artistic Director of the Academy Award nominated feature film The Children of Theatre Street, narrated by the

late Princess Grace of Monaco. Mireille Briane entered the Paris Opera Ballet School at age seven and was performing regularly onstage by the time she was eight. By age sixteen, she was a Principal Dancer at the Grand Theatre of Bordeaux, France. They were the founders and directors of the Briansky Saratoga Ballet Center summer ballet intensive at Skidmore College, Saratoga Springs, New York, which was in operation for 43 years. The Brianskys now teach their summer dance program at Mount Holyoke College in Massachusetts. They live in New York City and continue to take a keen interest in BGLV.

#### **Music Director**



Eugene Albulescu is an award-winning performer who combines a blazing technique with the artistic integrity and originality to express musical emotions at their most personal level. His emergence on the international scene came in 1994, when his debut recording (Albulescu Plays Liszt, MANU1446) earned him the Grand Prix du Disque Liszt, awarded for the best Liszt recording of the year, adding Albulescu's name to that of legendary recipients such as Horowitz and Brendel. Noted New York Times critic Harold Schonberg praised Albulescu in the American Record Guide for his "infallible fingers of steel," declaring that "nothing, anywhere, has any

terrors for him." His performances in New York at BargeMusic in 1996 attracted the attention of WNYC, which broadcast Albulescu's *Hammerklavier* interpretation live; he later gave his Carnegie Hall debut in the Stern Auditorium in 2001 performing Liszt's Piano Concerto No. 1.

Since then, Albulescu has worked as conductor and soloist with numerous major orchestras including the New Zealand Symphony, the Romanian National George Enescu Philharmonic, the New York Chamber Orchestra, the Manukau Symphony Orchestra, and Christchurch Symphony. He toured the US with the Barbizon Chamber Orchestra and later led two US tours as music director with the French Chamber Orchestra. His recordings have been released on Ode/Manu label, Ode/BMG, Trust, as well as Downstage Recordings. His most recent release on the Naxos label with the New Zealand Symphony features the "Rock Concerto," composed for Albulescu by celebrated New Zealand composer Jenny McLeod.

Albulescu's outreach in over one hundred US high schools has been significant, and his program "Inside the Piano" linking technology and creativity earned him coverage from the major media, including articles in the *Washington Post* and *Philadelphia Inquirer*, as well as the cover of *Clavier* Magazine. His work as conductor, soloist and recording artist spans four continents.

Albulescu started his piano studies in Romania at age six, at the Enescu Music School in Bucharest. His family moved to New Zealand in 1984 to escape Romania's Communist regime. He completed his musical studies at Indiana University where, at nineteen, he was the youngest person ever to teach as an assistant instructor. Eugene Albulescu is a Steinway Artist who currently teaches on the music faculty at Lehigh University in Bethlehem, PA.

#### **Guest Artists**

**Devon Teuscher** (Sugar Plum Fairy) Born in Pennsylvania, Devon Teuscher began her dance training at the age of nine under Deanna Doty of the Champaign Urbana Ballet Academy in Champaign, IL. When her family moved to Vermont, she continued her training at the Vermont Ballet Theatre School in Essex, Vermont under the direction of Alex and Kirsten Nagiba. At the age of eleven, Teuscher attended The Kirov Ballet Academy summer intensive. She also attended the Pacific Northwest Ballet summer intensive on full scholarship for two years.

From 2002 to 2006, Teuscher attended American Ballet Theatre's Summer Intensive, and was a National Training Scholar from 2003 to 2006. In January 2005, Teuscher relocated to New York City to dance at American Ballet Theatre's Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis School on full scholarship.

Teuscher joined ABT Studio Company in 2006 where she danced leading roles in *Raymonda, Les Sylphides, Swan Lake, Sleeping Beauty,* and various works by Jessica Lang. She joined American Ballet Theatre as an apprentice in December 2007 and the corps de ballet in June 2008. She became a Soloist in August 2014 and Principal Dancer in September 2017.

Her repertoire with the Company includes Polyhymnia in *Apollo*, a leading role in *Bach Partita*, Nikiya and a Shade in *La Bayadère*, Summer Fairy and Fairy Godmother in *Cinderella*, Aurora and Lead Mazurka/Czardas in *Coppélia*, Medora and Gulnare in *Le Corsaire*, Mercedes, the Dryad Queen and a Flower Girl in *Don Quixote*, the title role in *Firebird*, La Lionne in *Gaîté Parisienne*, Myrta in *Giselle*, Partisan Woman in *The Green Table*, Lead Persian Lady in *The Golden Cockerel*, Pierrette in *Harlequinade*, the title role in *Jane Eyre*, Caroline in *Jardin aux Lilas*, Spanish Dance and one of the Nutcracker's Sisters in Alexei Ratmansky's *The Nutcracker*, Natalia in *On the Dnieper*, Juliet, Rosaline's friend and Lady Capulet in *Romeo and Juliet*, Frost in *The Seasons*, Candide (Sincerity), Lilac Fairy and Diamond Fairy in Ratmansky's *The Sleeping Beauty*, Odette/Odile, the pas de trois, Spanish Princess and a big swan in *Swan Lake*, Terpsichore and Diana in *Sylvia*, Princess Tea Flower in *Whipped* Cream, leading roles in *AFTERITE*, *Chamber Symphony, Souvenir d'un lieu cher, Symphonie Concertante, Symphonic Variations, Thirteen Diversions* and *Valse Fantaisie*, and featured roles in, *Airs, Baker's Dozen*, *Citizen*, *Company B*, *Dream within a Dream (deferred)*, *Duets*, *Dumbarton*, *Everything Doesn't Happen at Once*, *Gong*, *In the Upper Room*, *Raymonda Divertissements*, and *Sinfonietta*.

She created the Fairy Candide (Sincerity) in Alexei Ratmansky's *The Sleeping Beauty* and roles in *After You, Her Notes, Serenade after Plato's Symposium, I Feel The Earth Move, Praedicere,* and *With a Chance of Rain.*

Alexandre Hammoudi (Sugar Plum Cavalier) Born in Paris, France, Alexandre Hammoudi began his training at ten with Max Bozzoni of the Paris Opera Ballet. He continued his training at the Academy of Dance Salle Playel in Paris from 1996-1999, and received further training at the English National Ballet School in London and at the School of American Ballet, both on full scholarship.

Hammoudi has won numerous international competitions, including the Trophee Arabesque and the Biarritz Dance Competition. At 17, Hammoudi became a member of the National Ballet of Cuba and toured South America with that company, dancing roles in *Carmen*, *Cinderella*, *Don* 

Quixote, the peasant pas de deux in Giselle, and the pas de six and mazurka in Swan Lake.

Hammoudi joined ABT Studio Company in 2002, joined the main Company as an apprentice in April 2003 and became a member of the corps de ballet in April 2004. He was appointed a Soloist in July 2012. His repertory with the Company includes the Rajah in La Bayadère, Pyotr and the Lead Highlander in The Bright Stream, Cavalier and Prince in Ashton's Cinderella, Lead Mazurka/Czardas in Coppélia, Espada in Don Quixote, Duo Concertant, Ivan in Alexei Ratmansky's Firebird, Albrecht in Giselle, Prince Afron in The Golden Cockerel, Pierrot in Harlequinade, Reverend Brocklehurst in Jane Eyre, The Man She Must Marry in Jardin aux Lilas, the Jailer in Manon, the Nutcracker-Prince in Alexei Ratmansky's The Nutcracker, Olga's Fiancé in On the Dnieper, Othello in Othello, Prince Gremin in Onegin, Friend of the Family in Pillar of Fire, Romeo, Tybalt and Paris in Romeo and Juliet, Prince Désiré in Ratmansky's The Sleeping Beauty, the Spanish Prince, a Fairy Knight and the Act II Pas de Deux in The Sleeping Beauty, Prince Siegfried and von Rothbart in Swan Lake, Orion and Apollo in Sylvia, Ladislav Slivovitz in Whipped Cream, leading roles in The Brahms-Haydn Variations, Désir, Her Notes, I Feel The Earth Move, Monotones II, Symphonie Concertante, Symphony #9 and Symphony in C and featured roles in AfterEffect, Black Tuesday, Brief Fling, Clear, Continuo, Glow-Stop, The Leaves Are Fading, Overgrown Path, Private Light, Raymonda Divertissements, and Sinfonietta.

He created Harlequin's Friend in Alexei Ratmansky's *Harlequinade*, the Spanish Dance in Ratmansky's *The Nutcracker*, the Spanish Prince in Ratmansky's *The Sleeping Beauty*, leading roles in *Seven Sonatas* and *Thirteen Diversions*, and featured roles in *Everything Doesn't Happen at Once, From Here on Out*, and *Pretty Good Year*.
